or many years the membership in Oxfordshire was fairly constant at around 300. In the last couple of years, that number has increased considerably. The last update we had from Head Office was that we have a total of 493 members of which 427 have submitted an email address. What's behind this increase, we're not sure, but hope that we can help all our members.

It struck us that with this increased number of members, there are many people who don't know us and we don't know them. So we thought it might be useful to clarify what we are about, what we try to do and what is the meaning of life!

Crohn's and Colitis UK was originally called the National Association for Colitis and Crohn's Disease (NACC) and started in a front room in St Albans in 1985. The Oxfordshire Group, as it was called then, started soon after.

Some of the team have been involved since the beginning and most of the others have been involved for many years. In the early days our focus was very much on fundraising and we got involved in just about every activity you can image. Grand balls, clay pigeon shooting, discos, dinner dances, concerts, horse racing nights - you name it, we've had a go! Of course we are talking pre internet and social media days. The Charity has obviously grown over the years and is now a large organisation. The national website is a valuable source of information with booklets and fact sheets available to download or request on many health related issues. We have been asked by the Gastroenterology Department at the John Radcliffe Hospital to help make our members aware of an exciting national project called OCTAVE (Observational Cohort Trial-T-cells Antibodies and Vaccine Efficacy in SARS-CoV-2). This multicentre study aims to assess COVID-19 vaccine responses in patients with chronic disease with Oxford leading on Liver Disease and IBD. The study has been granted NIHR high priority status and includes being able to deliver 150 Oxford/AZ vaccines to liver/IBD cohorts with bloods taken for immunophenotyping before and after each dose. This study is currently being undertaken at only two sites immunophenotyping before and after each dose. This study is currently being undertaken at only two sites nationally who are actively vaccinating.

If you suffer from any of the diseases detailed below and have not yet received your Covid vaccination and would be willing to be contacted by the OCTAVE research team, email your details (name/MRN) to;

You will then be approached with the aim to deliver the vaccine as soon as possible as part of the study. This will be both clinically beneficial and of huge research interest. Groups of interest:

- Cirrhosis (compensated and decompensated)
- Liver transplant recipients
- Autoimmune liver disease on immunosuppression
- Patients with IBD of any type taking immunosuppressive medications (including infliximab, adalimumab, vedolizumab, ustekinumab, and tofacitinib)

In summary, eligible participants must be an unvaccinated adult patient either on biologics or tofacitinib, able to travel to either the John Radcliffe or Churchill Hospitals, and willing to give blood samples to assess vaccine response. Travel expenses/parking may be able to be covered. Both doses will be given, of course.
